Gordon Allport's four requirements for successful reduction of prejudice



Intergroup Contact Theory, otherwise known as the contact hypothesis, was proposed by Gordon Allport during the "Jim Crow" era in the United States. The theory promotes that nurturing interpersonal contact between different social groups can reduce conflict and prejudice between different social group members. But, superficial contact between groups often reinforces prejudice.

Allport's original theory suggests that intergroup contact is most effective when four integrated conditions are met: equal group status, common goals, intergroup cooperation, and support from authority.
